

# The Bridge February 2018



Banff & King Edward Parish Churches

### Dear Friends in Banff and King Edward,

I was on a week's study leave recently; ministers are encouraged to take two weeks study leave each year. Sadly I have only taken now a total three since I was ordained, but each time I think I have benefited, especially through sharing with others of similar and different views. That's part of what church is about and partly why staying to chat after church over tea or coffee can be so helpful. But often people do not actually share their deep thoughts about life and faith openly, so I would like in coming months to give people another chance to briefly share their own faith journeys or views in church as a sort of testimony, If anyone would like to do this, please let me know. you probably feel you are not good enough, but don't let that stop you. God can speak through you especially when we are willing to go



Going deeper was the theme of the service in church in mid-January, drawing on the passage in chapter 5 of Luke's gospel, which spoke to me in unexpected ways while I was on study leave. Jesus asked the disciples to get into their boats and go deeper, even although they were exhausted and go back fishing. Simon Peter was exasperated and

answered, 'Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done so, they caught such a large number of

fish that their nets began to break. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Don't be afraid; from now on you will fish for people.'

We too may feel we've done all we can but Jesus effectively says follow me once again, don't be afraid, you can go deeper and help raise up people in their lives, and even find yourself changed with new purpose



In my studies, we were encouraged to attend an afternoon arts and crafts training session, which was way beyond my comfort zone. The art teacher explained all the different types of art we could do, and I panicked, wanting to run away. I remembered how at school I was useless at art. But partly because the teacher was very good, partly because I would have to



face my wife who is good at arts and crafts, and partly because of encouragement of doing it with others, I stayed. We were given a lump of clay and told to make a pot; I was again panicking until the teacher said, just stick you thumb in the middle; I did so and suddenly could see a pot begin to form. Maybe it was easier than I feared!! So often

in life with the right sort of encouragement from others, and trusting in God, we can indeed go deeper, than we think our humble talents allow, and at least stick our thumbs in!

Now I know the pot I made is not pretty but for me it's meaningful. We were encouraged to think about the Bible passages we had been studying the call of the disciples, and Jeremiah the prophet who knew great troubles, and let God guide us in pottery. The pictures you see here are the result. A pot in my eyes with God's hand upholding it / me and my finger prints inside pressing in all the wrong places even resisting. But on one side the

cross of Jesus shining out of the mess and inside some sand and seashells reminding of the seashore where He met with disciples and called them to go deeper; and a fish shape inside to symbolise Jesus calling us to be fishers of people, raising people up out of their depths. And echoing around my mind was the hymn, Lord, You have come to the seashore... desiring only that I should follow. O Lord, with your eyes set upon me, gently smiling, you have spoken my name; all I longed for



I have found by the water. At your side, I will seek other shores. It was another reminder to be willing to go deeper with Jesus as guide.

That pot spoke to me and maybe opened me up a little to the different ways God can speak to us. He can speak to us though Bible passages and prayer, through sharing and yes through art. Be open to the different ways God might speak with you

In the chapel where our group worshipped, they still had a centrepiece from Christmas, consisting of many candles of light surrounding a makeshift stable with a large star of light on top of it. The star signified the star that led wise men to Jesus and how the light had come down into a dark world to shine out, as we each light our candles. Lighting candles is not part of some protestant churches history but it can be very meaningful for example at our recent memorial service for the bereaved when somehow lighting a candle in memory of our loved ones seems right and helpful.



In the chapel service, one minister tried to light a candle, but as he turned away, it went out; he swithered what to do, and turned back and lit another candle which burned brightly. It somehow made me think that is the Christian life; we try to be a source of light but sometimes we fail. And sometimes we have to try again slightly differently, and find the light shines out.

Christmas has been and gone, but

through the dark winter days, you can be light. Life can be hard especially in winter but we have assurance that God came from the heights to be with us, sometimes especially when life is hard, for it was when Simon Peter felt exhausted that he came to open up more. Sometimes, it takes us till we are struggling to turn again and open up more to God and to others for help and support; and in our cries He hears us, and we know good can emerge out of it.

In the late 1840s Joseph Scriven, on the eve of his wedding day, learned that his bride-to-be had been tragically drowned. With a heart full of grief, he left his beloved Ireland and moved to Canada.

Once again he became engaged to be married, only to lose a second fiancée to a brief but fatal illness. Scriven spent the rest of his life helping the physically handicapped. His days were lonely, he was poor, and his own health was precarious. So he lived out his days teaching and ministering to others in Ontario. When he learned that his own mother back in Ireland was going through a distressing time, he wrote her a poem of consolation. They were the words that, in time, would ring around the world: What a Friend we have in Jesus All our sins and griefs to bear; What a privilege to carry Everything to God in prayer. O what peace we often forfeit, o what needless pain we bear; All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer.

Scriven knew hard times but found prayer helped and out of his hard times, we have a hymn we can sing to help us in our hard times, to remind us to pray and talk to Jesus as openly as Peter did. Chatting to someone recently relatively new to church, the person said that he had found a great comfort in prayer and unburdening his worries, even chatting with God.

Do join us when you can at our Prayer and Bible study group which meets twice a month at 7pm on Tuesdays.. or even pray alongside us at home at that time. I hope to introduce the 'app' I discovered on my study leave, 'pray as you go' which is a helpful daily 12 minutes of music, bible reading, reflections and prayer. If you can download apps onto your laptop or even better on your mobile phone, do try it; I have found it good for when you are out walking. It uses the Ignatian style of exploration, of chewing over bible passages so the same passage is helpfully read twice; for when we explore a passage more than once, we can go deeper and sometimes find God speaks anew. For the non-technical, you can just talk to God directly in your own prayer time.. or use one of the prayer guides available through the church like Upper Room or New Daylight. Do ask for help to get one if you cannot manage.

Going deeper in life is not easy, but keep talking and listening to God and be open to the different ways He might call you, even through the mystery of art.

We are about to launch our stewardship programme and **We're so excited, and we just can't hide it!** (Apologies to the Pointer sisters).

Last autumn the Kirk Session asked a small planning group to plan this programme with support from Fiona Penny, a Church of Scotland Stewardship Consultant. The group is chaired by Jim Buchan and other members are Trevor Leuty, David Locke, Joyce Millar, Irene Mckay, Kate Samuel, Janet Simpson, Elinor Smith and Irene Tewnion.

You may already have seen the logo

It represents a great deal of thought, work and prayerful consideration.



We were keen to show our vision for a Church that expresses its faith through sharing, caring and giving. We can all do that individually, as members of groups and as a Church as a whole. We wanted to let everyone know the extent of our work and encourage everyone to be involved.

Over the next few weeks, we will be recruiting visitors to go out to each church member and adherent's home

with a personal invitation to a special event in our Church hall on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> March at 7.00pm or Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> March at 2.00pm or Saturday 17 March at 10.00am. Transport can be provided when required. We do want to give as many people as possible an opportunity to attend and share in our excitement. You will be getting a "Save the Date" card delivered to your home address in the next three weeks but you can put the dates in your diary right now! Your visitor will be delivering your personal invitation during the last week of February.

Each event will last about 1½ hours and follow the same pattern – there will be displays of all the work and activities that our Church is involved in, followed by a presentation about the programme and finishing with refreshments. Everyone will be given a pack containing a brochure, a bookmark, a response form, a standing order form, a gift aid form and a reply envelope.

Before then, our Minister, David and our pastoral assistant, Vera will be preaching on the themes of the programme on four consecutive Sundays; on **28**<sup>th</sup> **January** David will consider sharing; on **4**<sup>th</sup> **February** Vera will look at pastoral care and caring; on **11**<sup>th</sup> **February** David will preach on giving and on **18**<sup>th</sup> **February** David will consider faith in our community. We hope you will be able to come along to each of these services.

Why are we doing this? We do want to share the excitement of all that is taking place in our Church and all that we do to reach out to the community. All of this requires us to use our time, our talents and our money – all are necessary and recently we have focussed on time and talents in particular. The focus here is on financial giving. We will be respectfully asking all our members and adherents to review their giving and to give in a regular, planned and tax efficient way. After all, we are the Body of Christ here on earth, doing His work and sharing His message – what a challenge! We hope that you will want to be counted in and play a part.

We will have more updates as time goes on but if you have any queries, please feel free to speak to any member of the planning group at any time. Some of you will be asked to be visitors, please consider this carefully – at no time will you be required to talk about financial giving, your task is to pass on a personal invitation and encourage as many people as possible to come to one of the special events.



The Children and Family Worker project which was established in Banff

Parish Church in 2016 is partly funded from our own resources and partly by the Go For It Fund which is based at 121 George Street. Several interested members of our congregation have asked for more information on Go For It.

Go For It is a Fund of the Church of Scotland and was established in May 2012. It's all about funding change in church and community. The Fund aims to encourage creative ways of

working, which develop the life and mission of the local church, and are transformative for both communities and congregations.

### Who can apply?

Any Church of Scotland congregation is welcome to apply. Any application must be focused on a project. For example, if you want to refurbish your church kitchen, that isn't something Go For It would fund. However if you're planning to develop a Community Cafe, and as part of that project you need to upgrade your church kitchen equipment, that is something we would consider funding.

Any application must be match-funded with at least 50% of a project's budget raised locally.

Any application should demonstrate a commitment to good partnership working. Go For It would want to know who you'll be actively working with in delivering the project, whether that be other denominations, the local school, Community Council, Health Centre, etc.

Finally, there are five criteria for funding, and successful applicants will evidence how they are meeting at least **two** of these, with statistical information and practical examples:

- Meeting identified needs in the community
- Nurturing Christian faith within and beyond the church
- Tackling poverty and/or social injustice
- Developing new ecclesial/ Christian communities

Creating work which is genuinely innovative and shares good practice with others

### How?



## STOP PRESS! VOLUNTEERS WELCOME FOR THE "TALKING BANFFIE"

Our friends at the "Talking Banffie" would welcome any help you could offer voluntarily in any of the following positions:

1. They are desperate for **Technicians**, and in particular, the post of **Chief Technician** to take charge of organising this part of the production of the Talking newspapers.

The volunteer Technicians, on a rota basis, would have to be good at computing in order to produce cds. It would involve being responsible for the sound and recording while the Readers are reading, and then producing the master cd.

Time needed would be 1½ hours every 4 or 5 weeks—depending on rota.

- 2. People to help with Admin. This would involve:
- getting the master cd; producing copies; putting the cds in pouches and sending them out. (The pouches are later returned by each listener.)

Time needed would be 1 hour every 3 weeks.

3. They are also desperate for **Editors**. These Editors would work in twos, but the task can be done in your own home. The Editors get a copy of the Banffie newspaper. They then check the paper and select the articles. Training will be given for this post.

Time needed would be 70 minutes reading time, every 3 or 4 weeks.

4. People to do the **Reading** while it's being recorded.

Time needed would be 1½ hours, once every 4 weeks.

Do come along and give it a try. We would be delighted to hear any ideas you might have for speakers, workshops, demonstrations or 'whatever'!




