Dear Friends in Banff and King Edward

We are approaching Easter when we will celebrate the hope of the risen Lord. And yet as I write, there is so much troublesome news around with Brexit and cyclone disasters and concerns about our world. And yet, **amidst sadness, the amazing message of Easter still shines out today**; amidst the pain of the Cross, there is Risen Hope and possibilities of new life, new ways forward amidst all that the world throws at us. That is the message behind our Easter banners and posters.



Mark's gospel records the message of hope amidst sadness that Jesus' followers received, as they went to take care of his body: Don't be alarmed, you are looking for

Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter, "He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you." Trembling and bewildered, the women went out" [Mark 16 v 6-8]. Life was so hard for Jesus and his followers as it often can be for us, as we journey through our fears and worries and hurts and losses. But the voice comes to them and us, don't be afraid; He has risen! He goes ahead of you and you will see Him, just as he told you. The women went out trembling, bewildered and afraid, as at times do we, but bit by bit, that fear would turn anew into the risen hope in their hearts, that would renew them and inspire them and lead them forward in new life, into sharing not fear but faith and forgiveness and love. A message that would renew a forlorn Peter, that he was forgiven and included, in the new hope and purpose, the message that is there for each of us today if we want to accept it. Somehow, through it all, we can find inner peace and strength even in the worst of times...for Christ is risen to give us hope and our world hope that new life and peace can be found. Jesus came to fearful disciples and said 'peace be with you' and challenged them and us to go out and share that peace and forgiveness with others.

Strangely, hope this year has arisen from one place you might not expect hope; our churches' annual reports and accounts! In both churches our treasurers give positive reports both about the state of our finances and about the growing health of our ongoing activities.

The improvements in finances were partly due to the hard work we all put

put into our stewardship programmes last year, which resulted in increased income and future sums pledged. Both churches also reported growing numbers attending and growing involvement in helping our local community — in King Edward through our work with our local Primary School and through teamwork, for example with the King Edward hall. In King Edward we were worried just a few months ago about how to spread the growing burdens in running our church. Thankfully we have found new ways of teamwork together with more people stepping up to do their bit, working in a more flexible way. In the longer run the Church of Scotland this year at the General assembly, which I will be attending, is looking at ways of reducing the growing administrative burden on smaller churches.

In Banff the annual report suggests we made progress in our mission of sharing the love of Jesus in our community and towards our vision of being a community hub where all can gather for friendship and support, welcoming people of all ages and from all backgrounds – and taking our care and faith out into the community. Our work with families and young people in our community is growing: around 165 children are involved, with Messy Church attended by 60 families. 5 new families started to attend Sunday Church – the target we had set ourselves over a year ago – and Sunday Club has restarted. More widely, many people not in Church have felt the benefit of our care and support.

I like the summary in the Banff annual report which applies equally to King Edward; our Church services offer a welcome space in people's lives for spiritual uplift, through calm and peace, fun and sharing, listening and learning, old and new, prayer and singing. Although we do not always have lots of children, we seek to encourage all ages to share together in ways that do not happen more generally in the community.

Our ministry team of Minister and superb Pastoral Assistant Vera has been enhanced over the past 6 months by student minister Christine McWhirter who amazingly is in only her first year of training – she has been greatly appreciated by all ages. Sadly we have to say farewell to Christine on the last Sunday of May as she goes on to her next place of training, but she goes with our blessings and prayers: she will surely be a great Minister for other congregations in years to come. There is hope; let's all try and open up again to it this Easter and share it with others: Christ is risen; He is risen indeed... for you.

10 things you didn't know about Banff Girl Guiding...

Banff Girl Guides (Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers) recently held their Thinking Day service in Banff Parish Church. We were very interested to hear from their leader, Lynn Campbell, about some of the changes to guiding and some of the things the girls enjoy. Read on...you might just get some surprises!



Girlguiding has a long history of empowering girls and young women to be their best. Rainbows (age 5-7) enjoy learning by doing and having fun. Brownies (age 7-10) try new things to help learn about themselves, their community and their world. Guides (age 10-14) tackle lots of different badges and awards and Rangers (age 14-18) begin to look wider, take charge and expand their horizons.

The Girl Guiding programme has just undergone massive transformation to bring all our badges and activities up-to-date. Our new programme delivers the fun and varied range of activities that you expect from guiding and, of course, there's still plenty of badges to earn. We've introduced new topics, new skills, and new ways for girls to broaden their horizons. The programme has six consistent themes – Know Myself, Express Myself, Be Well, Have Adventures, Take Action, Skills for my future – these run all the way from Rainbows to Rangers.

There are five interlinking principles that run throughout our programme. These are known as the Five Essentials.

- Working together in small groups
- Encouraging self-government and decision making
- A balanced and varied programme which is girl-led
- Caring for the individual
- Sharing a commitment to a common standard

When we make our Promise, the last line is to keep the (Brownie) Guide Law. This is....

A Brownie Guide thinks of others before herself and does a good turn every day

Banff Churches Together

I joined Banff Churches Together (BCT) as a representative for Banff Parish Church in August 2018, alongside Rev. David Locke, Andy Taylor and latterly Fran Ferguson. We attend monthly meetings with other Banff Churches including The River Church, Episcopal Church, Our Lady of Mount Carmel and Methodist Church members, as well as Macduff Parish Church and Shore Fellowship. It is hoped we can extend this representation to include all the school catchment area.

These meetings have been a revelation, in that I was unaware that so much fantastic work was going on behind the scenes, as all our churches cooperate together to improve the quality of life in our communities. Christine Cockburn from The River Church Banff kindly agreed to share the history and significance of being a member of BCT in the article below:

Banff Churches Together has been active since 1999 before the Millennium in 2000, when we got together to demonstrate our unity as Churches to the people of Banff and the surrounding area. The idea was proposed by some members of Banff Parish Church who contacted the other churches. It started as a grass roots movement to show our desire for more closeness among our congregations and to be united in serving our community. I was one of the first members at those early meetings and have continued to be involved ever since. We may all be different in the way we worship God, but we all worship the same God and Jesus Christ our saviour. So, we wanted to show that we could all work together for the benefit of the Community.

Some of the projects we work together on are the Food Bank, which operates out of Harvest Centre and is supported by the Churches in Banff, all contribute by volunteering and giving donations of food. There are also the World War One Memorial Garden, which now has a path to access it. The Banff Bridge event was held on the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1, and brought together people of our two towns, Macduff and Banff. Over 500 people took part and linked arms across the bridge.

From the cooperation among the Churches in Banff and Macduff in organising this very successful event the local ministers, David Locke,

strong desire to keep the up momentum and work more closely together in what they feel is an exciting time. They are very encouraged and feel it will lead to many new ideas and projects. Over the years the feeling of unity has grown and there is great camaraderie amongst us. I hope it goes on for another 20 years and more, as through it we can give a lead to projects and events which will benefit the people in Banff, Macduff and surrounding area. It shows that there is life, in all its fullness, to be found in Jesus Christ and it's for everyone.

Other events BCT organise include the annual November Remembrance Day Services and Parades, arranged by Andy Taylor. We are also made aware of Banffshire Pilgrimage Group activities. Our Chaplains are building successful partnerships with Banff Academy Banff, Macduff and King Edward Primaries to provide pastoral support for pupils.

Our own Minister David Locke represents BCT on the Banff Development Partnership as a passionate voice for regeneration in our community. Together with Rob McArthur from River Church, they attend Community Council Meetings, providing vital links of communication in raising awareness of the work and proposals of Aberdeenshire Council to BCT congregations and the wider community.



Recent initiatives involved an invitation for BCT to attend World Day of Prayer on Friday 1st March at Cornhill Church of Scotland Parish Church organised by Frances Webster and attended by 17 people from Banff, Whitehills and Cornhill churches. The service programme was written by the women of Slovenia and was grounded in the parable which

Jesus told about a great dinner in a rich man's home to which people off the street were invited. This was an interactive service, with members present representing the guests around the table telling their stories to reflect the

political and social life in Slovenia from communist times to the present day. In addition, singing hymns and joining in devotions and prayers were included followed by a lovely tea.

Macduff Parish Church extended an invitation to all BCT to participate in a Quiz Night on Saturday 2nd March in their Market Street Hall to raise funds for Tearfund. This charity has been in operation since 1968, to provide employment initiatives to women in rural areas of third world countries. A wonderful evening of fellowship was enjoyed by 56 participants from various Banff and Macduff Churches who enjoyed supper, fun and brain teasers from the Quiz Masters Neil, Liz and Chris Farguhar. A total of £371 was raised.



A significant part of our Easter week organised by BCT is the Good Friday Walk of Witness and Jenny Lee (Methodist churches) an active member of BCT has kindly designed the poster found on page 7.



PARENTALK Karen Cumming

We have just finished our very first Care for the Family Parentalk sessions with 3 of our mums from Tots and Teas. Having seen the course on the Care for the Family website (www.careforthefamily.org.uk) I thought it might be something of interest to families, whatever stage of parenting they're at. After lots of thought and prayer I finally took the plunge and sent out a letter to the group asking for volunteers to help pilot

the course.



Our sessions were held in the lower hall, with each of our 6 sessions lasting approximately one and a half hours. With a cup of tea and cake in hand we sat and watched, talked and shared our own experiences and the realities of bringing up children. Unfortunately, children don't come with instructions and we can feel as though we're making it up as we go along. We soon learned after session 1 that as parents "nobody's perfect and we're all in this together".

A little bit of information on Parentalk

WHAT IS PARENTALK? – It's a DVD based course that gives parents an opportunity to get together with other parents to talk and share their experiences of bringing up our children. Each session explores a particular theme about parenting and family life – a couple of examples are 'It's not just me' and 'Boundaries and battles'.

WHO'S IT FOR? - Parentalk is for parents of children up to early teenage years. It is suitable for parents from all different backgrounds and structures.

We are hoping to run another Parentalk in the near future. If this is something you or someone you know would like to attend, please get in touch.

A big thank you to the parents who helped trial the sessions, it was very much appreciated. Also to Sheila Smith who came along and supported me. Thank you!
