Dear Friends

How are you getting on? It does not really get easier and the ongoing tensions in households, the effects on wider physical, mental and social and economic health are growing. Life is often a battle and it seems we are still in the middle of it, not knowing which way the battle is going regarding the virus, with us caught in the middle. But know this, God is with us in the middle of it; you are not alone.

In our service on Sunday 30th August we thought about how David the boy shepherd won the battle against Goliath, unexpectedly, with the little he had, because he trusted God. Keep the faith – in times of change and hardship, God promises to be with his people, when they listen to Him. We thought about Eric Liddell the Scottish athlete, and how important to him were God's words; 'Those who honour me, I will honour'; Eric showed how true that is especially in hard times. He won the Olympics against immense obstacles, and is honoured in China, for his missionary work despite being a prisoner of war there and ultimately dying there.



Circumstances may appear to wreck our lives and God's plans, but God is not helpless among the ruins. God's love is still working. He comes in and takes the calamity and uses it victoriously, working out His wonderful plan of love.

His words reassure us; God is at work amongst us, not absent from us. When in China and on a very dangerous errand to save someone's life, Eric later recalled: "That night

as I lay down, my thoughts turned to the next day. Suppose I met the Japanese?... I felt for my Chinese New Testament, I constantly carried – it fell open at Luke 16. I read to verse 10, and this seemed to bring me my answer. 'He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much; and he that is unjust in the least is unjust also in much'. It was as if God had said to me: 'be honest and straight'. I turned and went to sleep, and started early the next morning.

A fellow prisoner described Eric as being ordinary but with a secret power: "Every morning about 6am with curtains tightly drawn, to keep in the shining of our peanut-oil lamp, lest the prowling sentries should think someone was trying to escape, he used to climb out of his top bunk, past the sleeping forms of his dormitory mates. Then, the two men would sit close together with the light just enough to illumine their bibles and notebooks. Silently they read, prayed, thought about the day's duties, noted what should be done. Eric was a man of prayer not only at set times...he talked to God all the time, naturally: his life was grounded in God, in faith and trust." Keep going being open to and listening for God's voice and doing the little things He calls you to do well.

On the front cover you see signs of King Edward and harvest. The picture of the harvester in Fisherie was taken by Margaret Henderson, Banff's new Session Clerk. Her background is both King Edward and Banff and she will help keep us going forward together as I know both communities and churches are very much in her heart. I would like again to thank Irene Finlayson for all the very hard work she has done as Banff Session Clerk and joint Session clerk over the past year. She has faithfully, determinedly and bravely worked very hard for us, through all that is going on under the virus and the sheer pressure on those trying to keep our church moving forward when many have become unavailable. We are very grateful and appreciative, as we are to Margaret for taking on the responsibility by herself now.

The top picture on the front was taken from David and Nina Duncan's marathon efforts recently as part of the church's efforts to recoup money for Banff Parish church, lost due to the pandemic's effects. As David said, they did their walks with 160 years between them; wonderful, and a testimony to what we can all still achieve...together. Maybe not in long walks but in the little things that affect others and in sharing, caring and praying.

There are some thoughts about harvest inside the Bridge. But I am wondering how will we celebrate harvest this year; or mark Remembrance Sunday or Holy Communion? Around Easter we held an informal communion together over the internet with each of us taking a little juice and bread in our homes. Since then the church of Scotland has confirmed that as a valid way for these times. Maybe we can do more than we think for communion, harvest and Remembrance – I would welcome suggestions. As you will read inside, we are challenged in these difficult times to "sing a new song", and be open to new ways forward. On the positive side, the way our churches up and down the land are adapting to offer services in new ways is exciting – thousands are hearing and feeling the gospel in meaningful ways perhaps for the first time. Being open to new ways forward for our times is vital.

As I write I don't know when our churches will reopen – it's not a straightforward process, but we will let you know soon in the case of Banff. Please keep praying for your churches and all working away to show God's care. You are in the prayers of me and others in your church. If anyone is finding it all too difficult, please do pick up the phone and phone me or a church leader.

Place for Pause - Singing a New Song

17th-22nd August was a week of prayer for our church and country, organised and led by the Rt Rev Dr Martin Fair, current Moderator of the Church of Scotland. Each morning, hundreds of Christians from around Scotland, as well as further afield, gathered to listen to a pre-recorded reflection. In the evenings we gathered again for live prayer sessions including time to chat and pray with a small group of others in 'breakout rooms'. Participants were

randomly assigned to a group of 6-8 others with the chance to talk together for around 10 minutes. While we were all quite nervous and stilted at first, this proved a great opportunity to find out what's happening in churches all over the country. One congregation had had a sole nominee preaching in a newly re-opened church with most people listening online and sending in postal votes!



Someone else spoke of how they had united with another congregation at the beginning of April but had not yet worshipped together; their service of unification is taking place next week. It helped us realise that, whatever the challenges in Banff and King Edward, things could be an awful lot worse!

A common theme that emerged was that for everyone, including those few whose churches had already reopened, there was a recognition that what we are returning to is not the same as what we had before, and nor should it be. While naturally this can lead to some sense of loss, most people were overwhelmingly optimistic about what their congregations had achieved over the last few months and the opportunities opening up. There seems to be a determination across the church to continue to develop new ways of sharing our core Christian message.

Perhaps this is why the final day had the title 'A new song'. We can be nervous of new songs, perhaps preferring the familiar words and tunes. But in most music, there are only 12 notes...but limitless ways to rearrange them. In opening up our churches again we are learning new ways of sharing God's message, but nothing fundamental to our faith will change. Instead we are challenged to take the same core elements but to re-arrange and re-order them in a way that helps increasing numbers of people come to know Jesus as friend and saviour. None of us knows yet what that will sound like; we just have to keep singing new tunes (and old ones) until we find the balance that fits our church, our people, our community.

Let us make a joyful noise!

Church Re-opening plans

Banff Parish Church

Banff Kirk Session have been working hard on the process of re-opening. Initially, this will be for the sanctuary only.

The Church of Scotland has provided detailed guidelines which we are required to implement prior to re-opening. A task force was appointed by the Kirk Session and, after many



meetings and a lot of hard work, a way forward was approved. At time of writing there are still some issues and practicalities to be resolved, but we are hoping a re-opening in October will be possible.

The final arrangements need to be approved by Presbytery and we would then hope to write to everybody to let them know the details and procedures. Be assured the church will do our utmost to keep you informed of relevant details once they are available. While it will be great to worship again in the building, the current regulations impose severe restrictions on the style of service and the numbers permitted to attend, and people should consider carefully the health warnings.

For those unable or unwilling to return to church, recorded services and other activities will continue to be provided (see pages 20 and 24). As always, Elders and the Minister are available should you need any pastoral support.

King Edward Parish Church

King Edward Church is considering when to reopen, and how the extensive regulations can be met in practice. The central church urges each church to go forward at its own pace, reflecting local circumstances, and as with



many churches, no final decision has yet been taken to re-open. Online services will continue to be provided and both Elders and the Minister are available should you need any pastoral support. The minister is exploring how best he can undertake online interactive assemblies with King Edward primary, using the Teams technology required by Aberdeenshire Council.

Financial Update – Banff Parish Church

Finance Team

From a financial perspective, a consequence of the closure of our Church buildings and the loss of our coming together in worship and the many other activities which our buildings host, is that we have lost an important element of our income. This is mostly due to an inability to undertake fundraising activities, but also in reduced giving through offerings. In total, this would amount to £25,000 in lost income (based on the 2019 accounts). We were faced with a substantial deficit in 2020.

Over many years, the church had built up some reserves in the form of savings, investments and endowments (some for restricted purposes) 'for a rainy day'. Lockdown was such a 'rainy day', so the main thrust of our plan has been to use our reserves to pay down the deficit.

We have undertaken a number of other initiatives to try to replace lost income and reduce our costs, including: recovering tax on Gift Aid donations; collecting envelope-based offerings; establishing donate facilities on FaceBook and website; utilising the Government's Job Retention Scheme where appropriate; applying for community grants. We also ran the Marathon in a Month campaign which certainly captured the attention of our large and growing online congregation and the wider community.

As a result of all of these actions, as long as our income and expenses remain on track, we should be in a position financially at the end of the year to continue normal church operations.

However, we have now utilised all our readily accessible reserves. Should there be another set of unforeseen circumstances with a similar effect to lockdown, we have no reserves to call on. Our reserves were built up over many years and from many sources (including legacies, endowments, fundraising activities, appeals). We are now putting together a programme of fundraising over the next two or three years with several streams of fundraising activity that funds our work in the community and rebuilds our reserves.





Small World!

In the last issue we printed a poem, The Deserted Smiddy, sent in by Tom McLennan. Here, one member of our congregation fills us in on what she believes some of the background to the poem to be, while Tom adds some detail that has come to light since our last issue.

I read the poem in the Bridge which refers to the smiddy at Bogmuchals. Bogmuchals is between Deskford and Fordyce. There was a school at Bogmuchals and along the road was the smiddy, busy at the time shoeing working farm horses in the area.

My grandparents lived half a mile from Bogmuchals and my aunt and father were born there and educated at the school. I have spoken to family — who remember a small shop but not exactly where it was situated. Many of the boys (loons) walked to the smiddy from the school at the end of the day.

The lodge referred to is Fordyce Lodge which is about ¼ of a mile from Bogmuchals school. The school is long since closed and in its time has been a piggery and general farm building – I haven't driven past for some time so I'm not sure if the school building still exists. I believe the smiddy building is no longer standing.

I did ask if the AC initials meant anything but they couldn't help.

Hope this is of some interest.

A Professor of Aberdeen University sent me links which I could access for myself. One of them was of old maps of the area which I checked and identified the locations of the 'Smiddy' and 'Skweel'.

Robbie Shepherd had also been contacted by the University and in his article in the Press and Journal some weeks ago he mentioned the poem. As a result, he was contacted by the daughter of a woman who had written the poem into a book of poems she kept. The entry indicated that it was written by the woman's neighbour. Apparently, the grandfather of the woman who contacted Robbie Shepherd would have been the 'Smithy' before leaving in 1917 to take over Glenbarry Smithy.

It's a small world and has cleared up the mystery.


