A couple of people have asked me if this virus is something an angry God has imposed on people to punish us for our sins, and I say a very clear no. It's not God wrathfully punishing us, but it is something humankind has brought on itself. We have known for many years of the risks of global virus, but done very little to prevent it. On the contrary God will be with us to help us battle it, as He was with us in World War 2 which likewise was brought on by humans, but also I believe was overcome by humans open to God's help and guidance



And may the light shining from our windows,

across road and wynd, glen and ben, kyle and isle,

be reflected in our hearts and hands and hopes.
